

### Findings: Environmental Health Concerns-Construction

"...they start construction way before we moved. And a lot of people got sick. Some people died... Friend of mine died a day before he's supposed to move. What they were doing is demolition these rooms. They were knocking walls down. And by the building being over a hundred years old, there was a lot of lead-based paint, carcinogens in the walls."

-Greg, age 72 during move, lived at previous building for 10 years

## Findings: Need for Better Information

"Ha! You call that manage? I thought it was horrible. I thought it was terrible. I don't know what in the world they're talking about. None of us did. We had a dozen meetings with the different companies, the different people. And it left all of us in a nervous state."

-Mary, age 93 during move, lived at previous building for 28 years

#### **Research Question**

## Findings: Jeopardizing Housing Voucher

"And my sister lived in (name of building) with me and she was... she didn't trust the move. So she just moved out before. And she ended up in a place where she lost her Section 8 and she's disabled. It's just... I think they should've had more people to explain it better and I don't know... it wasn't good."

-Ann, age 63 during move, lived at previous building for 5 years

#### **Research Question**

### Findings: Role of Older Adults in Urban Renewal

"I felt that if they was going to upgrade the building. Which we were complaining about long before they came in. About making certain changes to that building. I felt that they didn't have no regards to the seniors. They wanna construct this for younger people. Vitalize the downtown. And we was not to be a part of it."

-Debbie, age 58 during move, lived at previous building for 3 years

## Implications for Practice & Policy

Incorporate trauma informed housing assessments in work with older adults.

Who decides? Older Adult, Family, Service Providers

O What's at stake?

Emotional, Health-related and Financial Concerns

Use Relocation Assessment Tool (Perry et al., 2015).



## The Development of a Preservation Action Plan

In mid-2017, the City convened and led a task force comprised of community stakeholders to develop a Preservation Action Plan that will guide preservation efforts over the next five years. The creation of this group, known as the Detroit Affordable Housing Preservation Task Force, was modeled on best practices of cities like Chicago, Washington D.C., and Cleveland, which have established task forces to coordinate efforts around securing the long-term affordability and quality of LIHTC properties.

The Task Force's work was informed by previous preservation-focused working groups, including the LIHTC Working Group led by Community Development Advocates of Detroit (CDAD). Senior Housing Preservation-Detroit (SHP-D), the Recapitalization Task Force led by the Detroit Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) office, and the Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) Coalition of Detroit. The Task Force collaborated on a Preservation Action Plan through four working groups focused on: financially sustainable regulated affordable multifamily housing, financially distressed regulated multifamily housing, naturally occurring affordable multifamily housing, and scattered-site single-family LIHTC developments (not discussed in this document, but an important part of the group's work).

Affordable housing preservation strategies that the City will pursue are based on a shared set of implementation goals:

- Prevent regulated affordable units from converting to market rate.
- Prevent the loss of public investment, specifically HOME investments and rental assistance contracts funded through federal housing assistance programs.





## Covid-19 Deaths in Detroit 81.2% of deaths – African Americans




