


INTRODUCTION

As more stroke survivors are discharged home, essential care partners (ECPs) play a crucial role in bridging the care gap, providing 75% of care within the healthcare system [1]. With limited support during hospital-to-home transitions, many **ECPs face increased** responsibilities and financial strain, affecting their psychosocial well-being [2,3].Community-based organizations (CBOs) can support ECPs during critical ransitions [4], however little is known about how to integrate community care into transitional care planning for ECPs.

INSIGHTS FROM A RAPID REVIEW ON INTERSECTORAL PARTNERSHIPS AND INTEGRATED CARE INTERVENTIONS FOR ESSENTIAL CARE PARTNERS

OBJECTIVES

- To explore what existing transitional interventions have been used to support stroke ECPs during critical care transitions
 - To identify in what capacity **CBOs** (intersectoral partnerships), volunteers, and **leisure modalities** were involved?

METHODOLOGY

Using the5-step rapid review method [5], to:

- 1. Refine the **topic and research questions**
- 2. Create a **search strategy** to search key databases (Medline, Cochrane, Embase, CINAHL, Pubmed)
- 3. Complete screening process (using Covidence)
- 4. Extract the data

DATA SYNTHESIS: WHAT WE FOUND

[1] Limited involvement of CBOs and volunteers [2] Primarily focused on education and training to support stroke survivors, with minimal attention to ECP-specific psychosocial and leisure needs

[3] Extended support beyond acute care and discharge is associated with improved ECP outcomes [4] Limited ECP experience-based research **[5]** Limited Canadian understanding and sociopolitical context

SO WHAT? NEXT STEPS

- Our findings highlight a gap in transitional care for stroke in the Canadian sociopolitical context where their roles remain underutilized
- Our findings will inform a CIHR-funded Postdoctoral works, for whom, under what conditions' (2) a World Cafe Workshop to identify research and community care priorities
