## Background/Rationale:

In 2004, through a CanMEDS research and development grant from the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, a 39-hour certificate program was developed. It was implemented in 2005 at the University of Toronto to health professional educational leaders from the following faculties/departments.

Faculty of Medicine Department of Nutritional Sciences

Faculty of Nursing Department of Occupational Science & Occupational

Therapy

Faculty of Pharmacy Department of Physical Therapy

Faculty of Social Work Department of Speech Language Pathology

This program has been offered to Canadian and international audiences for over 15 years and has also been provided in truncated formats through workshops, seminars, and custom programs.

## **Specific Aims and Mission:**

This program aims to develop leaders in interprofessional education and collaborative practice who have the knowledge, skills and attitudes to facilitate learners and colleagues in the art and science of working collaboratively and partnering for care.

University of Toronto CPD Credits will be sought for College of Family Physicians of Canada Mainpro+; Royal College Maintenance of Certification Section 1; American Medical Association Category 1; European Union for Medical Specialists UEMS-EACCME®; Certificate of Completion in Continuing Professional Development.

# **Learning Objectives:**

By the end of this program, participants will be able to achieve the following objectives:

- Characterize the rationale for advancing interprofessional education (IPE) and collaborative practice (CP), including utilizing the Canadian Interprofessional Health Collaborative (CIHC) Competency Framework, for leaders across healthcare systems.
- Apply CIHC competencies to IPE/CP learning activities for students and/or clinicians.
- Develop strategies to enable increased faculty/clinical capacity and engagement in IPE/CP in academic and practice settings.
- Produce a specific organizational interprofessional project, initiative, or activity that can be implemented upon return to community.

#### The ehpic™model of teaching and learning:

This program will broaden participants knowledge base on the theory related to interprofessional education. As previous participants describe, they experience "an immersion into an interprofessional lab looking at IPE". They have commented on the value of learning, living and reflecting about group dynamics and use the experiences gained to embed them in future education and practice situations.

The most powerful teaching/learning tool, as described by previous participants, seems to be "watching [the] facilitators and learning from them." The role modeling of collaborative practice

cannot be an act – it must be lived. The facilitators in this program have lived the parallel process of learning how to address their own group dynamics in order to be able to teach about collaborative practice processes...effectively and authentically.

This program is modeled after a train-the-trainer model. As participants finish the program, they consider how they will implement what they have learned to teach others skills in interprofessional collaboration in their own setting.

In recognition of the value and impact of the *ehpic*™ program, CACHE is the recipient of the **University of Toronto's Faculty of Medicine 2018-2019** *Excellence in Interprofessional Continuing Professional Development Award*. The award recognizes and promotes the importance of innovative programs in continuing professional development for health professionals.

#### **Education and Engagement Strategies:**

We aim to integrate lived, practical experiences from interprofessional education, care/practice and/or research with lessons and tools derived from research literature. We will learn about, from and with each other, encouraging ongoing reflection through dialogue in your small groups. We also will weave the CIHC competencies together and bring them to life through meaningful and varied cases, stories, and video simulations. We will use a variety of evidence-informed and experientially refined approaches to education and engagement. We purposefully draw upon multiple paradigms, philosophies and pedagogies to encourage knowledge building as a community, and transformative approaches to challenge assumptions and status quo toward positive change.
